PRECARIOUS EMPLOYMENT AND DIGITAL WORLD

The consequences of precarious employment are many, ranging from individual, such as salary effects to effects on families and communities, to mention some. The intensification of precarious employment can be seen as a current phenomenon. The most hidden consequences, such as the situation of 'undocumented' workers, range from health and safety issues at work to civic engagement and citizenship issues at large. Papers may examine forms of precarious employment and various impacts of these positions, including family, health, civic engagement, political participation, generational shifts, gender inequality and other areas of social life. The digital divide may bring in an additional aspect to the precarious employment.

The stream especially welcomes papers that relate to the themes described above. If you wish to propose a session within the stream, that is, 3-4 papers tied together with specific focus or theme, the organizers will try to accommodate them in the programme.
